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

WELCOME FROM THE PRESIDENT

It is with great pleasure that I welcome you to review the Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces' Community Report for 2012-2014.

The life of Herbert Carnegie, a co-founder and first president of the Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces Foundation, was devoted to character building. His vision resulted in our developing a formal character education program for schools over 18 years ago. Character building is now an education policy of the Ontario government.

From what was then the borough of North York, the Future Aces program is now in schools across the province, motivating and inspiring students to have a positive attitude and with that attitude to take action that betters themselves and helps others around them. Those in the various school communities, including educators, student leaders and parents, who have participated in the Future Aces program deserve recognition for getting us to the point celebrated in this report.

For more than 27 years, Future Aces has given scholarships to graduating high school students. In 2014, we doubled the number of scholarships awarded as a result of a very generous donation from the family of one of our loyal supporters. Details about the scholarship program will be found later in this report. At our 2014 Citizenship Awards and Scholarship Reception, Future Aces' presence in schools outside of the Greater Toronto Area was evident through the participation of Mr. W. R. (Rusty) Hick, director of the Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board, who brought greetings to the scholarship recipients. Future Aces recognizes and encourages character beyond the school community through our Aces Awards event and our positive ticketing programs. This community report provides highlights of both. The positive ticketing programs, in particular, magnify the impact of our resources through the use of partnerships with large public sector service organizations.

An organization cannot function without funds. I thank the donors and other funders for making our programs possible. Pro bono assistance is also very much appreciated, and thanks go to those who played in our charity golf tournament and attended our Aces Awards evening, our two major fund raising events.

Our volunteers are important to us. I note two in particular because they have known Future Aces as students in our earlier years. Anna Sheu became a member of the board of directors during the period of this report. She experienced Future Aces as an elementary school-age child attending the first school to have a Future Aces program. Elizabeth Nahabetian became co-chair of our golf committee. She was amongst the earliest recipients of a Future Aces scholarship.

You will be hearing from some of our staff later in this report. The dedication exhibited by all staff has ensured that our programs make a difference.

The board of directors is grateful for all the support given to Future Aces and proud of the Future Aces activities and accomplishments that you will learn about in this report.



STRENGTHENING CHARACTER

THE FUTURE ACES PROGRAM

The Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces Foundation works with staff, students and Future Aces-trained staff advisors to implement the Future Aces Philosophy in schools across Ontario. The Philosophy is implemented during the school year through a series of components that together lead schools to create a Future Aces learning environment. The components are:

- Two day Teacher Training Institute and Followup Training Institute: A two-day session designed to provide staff with the knowledge and resources required to implement character and equity initiatives at their schools, including tools, strategies and planning time, along with a follow-up to provide schools with strategies for sustainability.
- Future Aces Presentation (full school): At the secondary school level, this is a one-hour motivational and empowerment assembly planned with the assistance of each school's Future Aces Student Club, teacher liaison and Future Aces-trained Advisor. At the primary and intermediary levels, this is a motivational assembly designed to introduce and/or review the Future Aces Philosophy and reinforce the individual Board of Education's character mandate.
- Full School Staff Workshop: A one-hour workshop with all teaching staff aimed at providing them with tools and strategies for integrating character education into their classrooms and wider school community.

- School Implementation In-Service with committee support: For elementary, intermediary and select secondary schools, this is a one-day workshop held at individual schools with students and/or staff and/or parents. It is designed to provide them with the tools to plan and execute character initiatives in their community. For secondary schools, in-service takes the form of twice-a-month visits by Future Aces-trained advisors with Future Aces Student Clubs to plan and execute character initiatives school-wide.
- Leadership Symposium (grades 4-6): A one-day leadership opportunity aimed at providing students with the skills and tools needed to empower their peers and implement character initiatives in their schools. Part two of the symposium is a half-day year-end celebration in which the students review their personal growth and share their school/community accomplishments related to their Future Aces character initiatives.
- Leadership Conference (grades 7-10): A three-day leadership opportunity that focuses on self-awareness and self-efficacy, leadership development, empowerment and a call to action and implementation of community service projects. Part two of the conference – Returning FACES – is a one-day session for conference delegates to reconvene and share progress and lessons learned on their school/community service projects.



Over the past four years at Weston Collegiate Institute, the Future Aces Program has grown from a mere four students to 93 strong and thriving. As a program, we not only embody the Future Aces Creed by promoting the character traits of the months through various school wide initiatives such as Spirit days, Awareness weeks, mentoring of youth in our feeder schools, community service, tutoring programs, and this year we will host our Third Annual I Rock Leadership Conference that serves to empower students to begin a journey of self discovery.

ABOUT THE IROCK CONFERENCE

Now in its fourth year at Weston Collegiate Institute (C.I.) in Toronto, the IROCK conference has been a forum to help inspire students. This year, 114 students participated. They, as students who have attended in the past, have found the event to be an inspirational and life- changing day.

The name - IROCK - has two meanings: Individuals 'rock' in their own ways; And in order to be 'solid as a rock', people to be firm in who they are, while holding onto their individual values and truths.

The conference is the brainchild of Fauzya Alarakhiya, a grade 12 English teacher at Weston C.I., as a way to help build character in her students. When an annual Future Aces excursion trip to Chatham was cancelled, Fauzya was looking for a way to create another character building, enriching experience for her students.

The initiative was first approved in 2010 by the school's principal, Deborah Blair, and is funded through the Ontario Ministry of Education's Urban Priority High School initiative funding. Since then, it has become an annual event that students in grades 9 to 12 look forward to.

It features inspirational guest speakers who share their powerful stories with the students.

This year, because there were more guest speakers, special commemorative "Be the Change" t-shirts and bracelets were also created.

The IROCK conference isn't the only Future Aces initiative at Weston C.I. Character-building initiatives take place each month. The school also practices all the elements of the Future Aces Creed.


Fauzya hopes that the conference will grow into an overnight camp experience that also features team building activities, while helping students to discover their true selves.

As a published author, co-founder and president of the Love Our Lives Organization, Leanne has been given an opportunity to speak at universities, community groups, the YWCA, Girls Inc., hospitals, etc., on issues of bullying, low selfesteem and the cycle of abuse.

Leanne is currently writing programs for young girls and women on how to deal with issues they

may face in a practical way. She also intends to write a second book and is working with other young people on an organization which promotes peer mentorship and creating new ideas. It is Leanne's desires to finish her honours degree in Human Rights and Equity Studies and build organizations, while remaining a positive role-model within her community.

2015: Deeper Roots, Broader Branches

Looking forward to 2015, I would like to highlight the following activities and goals.

Achieving depth

- Organizational Development: The Foundation recognizes the importance of a strong and effective organizational structure. In 2015, we will continue to develop our board committees and their roles as a part of our organizational development efforts.
- ✓ Thought Leader: The Foundation is working to become a recognized expert on Character Education and leader in the character education community in Ontario, and indeed Canada.

Broadening our reach

- New Program: In 2014, we were notified by the Ontario Trillium Foundation that we were the successful recipient of a two and a half year grant to launch and deliver our pilot Francophone Future Aces Program, Initiative Créant des Étudiants Positifs, commencing in September 2015. In March 2015, we hired Dilaila Longo-Sincholle as our Francophone Program Officer.
- Increased Scholarships: We will maintain our level of scholarship giving reached in 2014, awarding \$60,000 in scholarships to young Canadians entering their first year of post-secondary studies. Many thanks to our very generous donors for making this possible.

REDEDICATION OF ARENA

On May 2, 2001, the City of Toronto renamed the former North York Centennial Arena, the Herbert H. Carnegie Centennial Centre in honour of our founder. More than a decade later, the Arena was rededicated after a much-needed facelift and with a new purpose in mind.

The rededication project was led by Bernice Carnegie and a team of volunteers including, students Sarah Gubala and Summer Mackie; friends of Future Aces, Tariq Nafis and Patricia White; and, Foundation staff, Andrew Gibson. The project - lasting more than six months culminated in the rededication ceremony of the Arena on the final day of Herb Carnegie Future Aces Week - September 19, 2014.

Hosted by the Carnegie family, the ceremony saw the unveiling of a unique portrait of Herb Carnegie by Toronto artist Mark Stoddart and included a free skate for community members and students from our Future Aces schools.

The Herbert H. Carnegie Centennial Centre now houses Dr. Carnegie's awards and keepsakes as well as showcases his many accomplishments.


